

HALF TIME SCORE Watermead Res 1 Nightclub 0

The hugely controversial nightclub plan was withdrawn by developer David Skinner on 18th October 1994 with no prior notice of the intention to withdraw given to the Residents Committee.

The *Bucks Herald* carried a story on 27th October stating that the nightclub plan may be resubmitted. Residents Committee Chairman Michael Shrimpton has obtained a copy of the withdrawal letter, which refers to an intention to resubmit within weeks.

At its meeting on Sunday 23rd October the Residents Association Committee, in view of the threat of re-submission, resolved to maintain the fighting fund. The petition as drawn up, signed by over 900 people, will need to be redrawn in respect of any new application. The position will be closely monitored and an emergency meeting convened in the event of a further planning application. The Committee will continue to maintain close contact with local councillors and businesses on Watermead. Almost certainly there will be a public meeting within the new objection period. It is being assumed that the next application, if it goes in, will be bounced on residents in the same way the first one was and that the Committee will have to act quickly.

In a dramatic development the Committee has resolved to set up a company empowered to buy land on Watermead and control adverse development with shares being primarily offerred to Watermead residents. The *Bucks Herald* on 20th October corrected

an earlier story which mistakenly reported that the land on which it is proposed to build the nightclub extension (presently still in the hands of the receivers) was offered to the Residents Association for £1

WVRA Chairman Michael Shrimpton has asked the informal committee of planning experts which first met during the campaign to be put on a permanent footing. They will examine any fresh application for a nightclub and it is intended to review all future planning applications for development on Watermead. The group, composed entirely of Watermead residents, includes planning lawyers, architects and other planning specialists. It is envisaged that it will made available as a resource to individual residents once the immediate crisis is over.

The Directors reccomend that the £1.00 shares be purchased in parcels of 10 or 50 (£10.00 to £50.00). Further details will be published soon.





In the last few years, the ancient parish of St. James the Great, Bierton has expanded almost out of recognition, with first The Coppice and then Watermead being built within the parish boundary. Our own development has added over 800 homes and possibly 2,000 to 2,500 people to the parish. Perhaps it is just as well that the old practice of visiting by the vicar has died out, being neither practical today, nor wanted by the vast majority of people. At the same time, it is important that any resident wishing to find either the church or the Vicar should have that information available to them. The easiest way is to telephone either the Vicar or myself. I am training for the Lay Ministry and will always be glad to help you in any way that I can.

St. James the Great celebrated the 700th Anniversary of the appointment of its first Vicar in late July. We had four days of exhausting activity, a flower festival, an exhibition of old photographs of the village, two concerts and special services of thanksgiving. We also published a book about the village of Bierton, the people and the church. It contains many memories and anecdotes contributed by local people, and a wonderful selection of old photographs. (The exhibition was of all the photographs that we could not fit into the book!) If you would like to see a copy, please telephone me.

Our regular services are 8 am Holy Communion (said), 9 am Holy Communion with hymns and 6 pm Evensong. We have a Sunday School, and a monthly Family service at 11 am on the third Sunday of the month. There is also a club for youngsters aged between 8 and 14 years, and called AMICUS, which meets during term time.

irst a formal welcome to our first edition of Village View! Before I make a passing reference to a certain planning application I would like to thank Ron Cunnington, our new editor, for his hard work in putting this issue and the Nightclub Nightmare emergency issue together. May I also thank Anne King for her hard work over several years on Blusterette.

Victory in round one is obviously good news. However my current assessment is that we will be facing Son of Nightclub fairly soon. I expect that the revised plan will make greater provision for car parking (it will need to) and it may be that the description will change from nightclub to country club!. Who knows what the opposition's intensions are ?(sic) We will continue to fight any proposal for a nightclub on Watermead. I am far from persuaded that Aylesbury in fact needs another nightclub - we already have the Rectory, just one mile up the road, and I am told by the new management at what was Mangrove Jacks that there is a possibility of that nightclub being re-opened, minus shooters

A word of thanks to all those who rallied round and either helped out or contributed to the fighting fund. It was good to see the numbers signing the petition. Marvellous also to have the support of Weedon Parish Council, although I am sorry to note that one of our District Councillors, Mrs. Metcalfe, was unable to support us. I am also concerned that Thames Valley Police did not oppose the application. I shall be writing to the Police Authority seeking a firmer line.

Within the financial constraints imposed on us by the level of your donations I thought we did reasonably well first time around. I must be blunt however - we need further substantial input into our fighting fund. The level of organised opposition is determined by the funds you make available. It is as simple as that. There were three very generous donations of £100 and numerous smaller donations, but several hundred residents did not support the fund at all. Do not leave it up to your neighbours, because you may find that they are leaving it up to you.

At the time of writing we are in the process of setting up a company, with the initial aim of buying up land from the receivers, including of course the land on which the nightclub developer wishes to build. I say little more about that for reasons which may require little explanation. Anyone willing in principle to invest in shares should contact us asap. I know I mooted this idea at the end of 1993 with little positive response (ie from about three people!) but circumstances are now different. Incidentally, I deny emphatically the mischievous assertion that the land on which it is proposed to put the nightclub was ever offered to us for £1, or indeed for any sum at all. There were informal discussions about other parcels of land and the ornamental lake, which involved us employing someone for 1-2 days a week to maintain it, but without the necessary funds even that modest proposal could not go forward.

Of course the nightclub is not the only issue in our community, although its immediate importance outweighs any other. There was a very serious incident some weeks ago in which one of the cygnets was savaged by a dog. The poor cygnet required over 50 stitches and I am told may never fly again. I would like to believe that the dog did not belong to a resident, but I would ask every one to keep dogs on a lead, particularly near the wildlife. A word of praise for St. Tiggywinkles, the wildlife hospital at Headdenham, who look after the injured wildfowl and who cared for the cygnet.

HOUSE PRICES

The Watermead Village Residents Association have commissioned a detailed report on the likely impact of the nightclub development on values in Watermead from Vernons, Chartered Surveyors. The picture is not good, with values falling by up top 10% in a swathe of homes on or near the lake, including the flats around the ornamental lake. Surprisingly the report suggests that other homes will not be affected at all and the Residents Committee fear that the reports' conclusions may be con-


servative. Copies of the report will be made available to residents on payment of photocopying costs. Residents who want individual valuation reports should of course instruct their own surveyor. Vernons put a team of surveyors on the job and are of course fully acquainted with the detail of the proposed plans.

HOW MANY?

The Watermead Village Residents Association, in estimating a figure of 750, has been accused of giving misleading statistics for the capacity of the proposed night club. Here are the facts!

Dancers require between 0.55 and 0.9 square metres MINIMUM, restaurant diners require between 0.9 and 1.1 square metres - the same figures can be utilised for night club patrons sitting at tables or at the bar and the median figure of 1 square metre used.

The proposed dance area is 90 square metres and will therefore accommodate some 125 people. The outer dance floor area is 190 square metres with an overlooking gallery of 132 square metres, the combined downstairs and upstairs seating areas are some 316 square metres making a total seating area of some 638 square metres. This combined area will accommodate a total at any one time of some 763 persons and, as people tend to come and go at such activities,

it is likely that the numbers passing through the portals are likely to be much, much higher! If the void over the dance area was to be floored then another 56 people could be accommodated and if, for instance, the upstairs lounge was used for dancing the numbers would again increase. Following this through it would be possible to accommodate in excess of 1,00 people without obtaining further planning permission.




St Tiggywinkles have come to our rescue on a number of occasions recently, apart from their splendid work for the injured cygnet, and I don't
