Second 'action day' planned in the new year

What horrid weather, but oh what a wonderful day. About 40 people turned out to help on the Watermead 'action day'. There was a heavy downpour at 8:30am and I was in half a mind to cancel the project, but just at 9am the rain stopped and the teams started to arrive.

Plan 'A' was to restore the path to it's designed width along the lakeside from the Pub as far as the Cabin car park, as well as restoring the path along the spine road up to the end of the Balloon Meadow. We also wanted to do a similar thing with the paths around the little bandstand area. Sadly, the rain had done it's worst and the paths were just too muddy. Not to be outdone, the teams decided

to clear out the undergrowth around the same areas whilst Michael Shrimpton completed his advanced driving test on the Green Machine.

We broke for coffee in the Village Hall at 11am and as luck would have it, it rained during the coffee break and stopped almost completely just as the last dregs were consumed. The rain held off until just after 1pm when we broke for lunch at the Hutchings' house. Some folk had to give up after lunch because they had other commitments. The rest continued until about 4pm when we all retired soaked but happy. The rain had caught us out about an hour before the clearing up was completed. (...continued page 5)

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Chairman's View

Compliments of the season, a very Merry Christmas and a prosperous New Millennium to you all.

Of course the place is looking a lot tidier than this time last year thanks in no small part to the excellent efforts of Gordon Bonnick and Roy Hutchings. October's 'action day' was a great success and we plan to have regular days from now on - they are a great way to engender community spirit, very worthwhile, good exercise and good fun. My thanks to everyone who took part, or supplied tools or kept the volunteers fed. Over the course of the year 2000 we should have every yard of path cleared and resurfaced and every copse tidied up and cut back.

I was asked by a number of the volunteers, many of whom were new to Watermead, whether or not we could have a fireworks event next year. The response to the 'action day' was so encouraging, I think that it is seriously worth pursuing, possibly with sponsorship from the garden centre and the hotel/fitness centre, as well as the Watermead Inn. Comments would be welcome, as planning would have to start by the end of January (professional firework teams have to booked up to a year in advance for the the first week in November and based on past experience we will need formal highway orders again to control traffic).

Construction of the garden centre should start by Easter - I am in touch with the developer, who is very conscious of the need to work with the local community. It should be open for the 2000 Christmas season.

I am asked constantly about the security point on the spine

road. This attractive feature was originally designed to house the security guards who were supposed to protect the estate, the idea being that the spine road would always be a private road, with a barrier. That all went with the ERM, the property crash and Royco's receivership. The receivers have not looked after the building and sadly it has fallen into disrepair. Lakeside Land Ltd does not own the building and has no control over it. Either it will be pulled down or the feature incorporated in some way into the garden centre. The garden centre are looking at that and I have asked for a way to be found to keep the 'hut'.

Many of you will have noticed

the improvements to the central area, which continues to be administrated by LCAM. Mick Lewis (Avanti), who is a director of LCAM, has been particularly energetic in this respect and I am grateful to him. The bent lamp posts (constantly reversed into by commercial vehicles servicing the Piazza) have at last been straightened. If you see a vehicle hitting a lamp post, or causing other damage in the car park, please take its number and report it to a director of LCAM. Mention of the car park brings me onto the subject of vehicle dumping. This is largely under control, but LCAM's solicitors are having difficulties with the trustee in bankruptcy re. the dumped Rover 200. We cannot dispose of it and neither can the police or local authority, as it it is not parked on the highway. The trustee will not be given forever to decide how to deal with it as he has been so lax in securing the bankcrupt's property that its value must now be lower than the cost of recovery. It is now fit only for scrapping and we will tow it to the scrapyard once the trustee gives us We are still battling on the

We are still battling on the website and I am afraid that I

can only ask you to watch this space! There is an unofficial website up-and-running.

Lakeside Land Ltd have registered the name www.watermead.co.uk. I know that there are a number of entrepreneurs on at Watermead and we would be grateful to hear from them.

Fishing continues to be a problem, due to the wilful trespass of a small number of individuals, who have now been identified. Fishing on both lakes is private and in addition to a fishing licence you need to be a member of either Watermead Piscatorials or the Captain's Cabin syndicate and have permission from Lakeside Land Ltd to exercise riparian rights from our land (which includes the land opposite the Watermead Inn). The Directors are adopting a tough policy on trespass - illegal fishing and camping not only endangers wildlife (eg through use of lead weights) and fish-stocks, but causes upset and inconvenience for residents and violates the rights of those who have paid to fish. Both lakes were stocked at private expense - the fish did not swim in - and the syndicates have responsibility for bailiffing the lakes and maintaining stocks.

I wish the Ducks the best of luck, after a troubled start to the season. Relations with the club are very good and I am grateful to the Directors (who were kind enough to invite me to the first home game of the season) for taking the trouble to try and keep fans' cars off the spine road I think everyone recognises the limitations of the present site, but at least football is played at a reasonable hour. The long-term solution is a new home, but that is many years away. We would like to be good neighbours on Watermead and I look forward to continued co-operation between the two Boards of Directors (once the rescue package is in place) in the interests of the local community, the fans and the Ducks. They are after all the Home Team!

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
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Vale Volunteers - making the difference in Aylesbury Vale

With winter time now upon us, what have we to look forward to?

Months of dark evenings in front of the TV, cold grey days reducing outdoor activities. With more time on our hands now is the time to widen our interests.

Why not try your hand at helping in the local community as a volunteer? But, where do you start and how do you choose the sort of volunteering which is right for you? 'Vale Volunteers' is the local 'Job Shop' for volunteering in the Aylesbury Vale. It exists to assist local charities and not-for-profit making organisations to find helpers and potential helpers to find the kind of voluntary work that suits them. It can match your needs and skills to the volunteering vacancies on its books. arrange introductions to community organisations and keep in touch to make sure you're settling in. At present the need for helpers is very great - over 250 groups in Aylesbury Vale are currently looking for additional unpaid help. What they seek covers a very wide range indeed, from people able to pop in to see a housebound neighbour for Age Concern, or help in schools giving about an hour once a week to listen to young readers, to those able to drive the disabled or elderly to a club, shopping or an appointment. There are also

opportunities for helpers with specialised skills such as computing, complementary therapies, secretarial or accounting. For those who can travel, the vast majority of groups looking for volunteers will pay a mileage rate, or re-imburse bus fares.

There are so many volunteering opportunities in and around Aylesbury that it is impossible to list more than a representative few. Work with babies, children, animals, office work, shop work, driving, advice giving, environmental activities; the list goes on and on.

Whatever you choose you will have the satisfaction of knowing that giving your time is making a real difference in the community.

Volunteering is not just a one way process. Obviously the organisation being helped gains your time, skills and enthusiasm, but as a volunteer you can also find your life enriched by new friendships and interests, and what you learn may also help you in other ways. There is no upper age limit, everyone who is willing and able to give time will be considered.

So decide to make this winter different and give volunteering a try.

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Meningitis and the new meningitis 'C' vaccine

Currently we are getting many enquiries about meningitis and the new vaccine, as there has already been cases of meningitis in our area. So I will repeat the early signs and symptoms of this very serious disease and tell you about the meningitis 'C' vaccine.

The early signs may resemble flu or a hangover. These may include vomiting, fever, irritability and, in babies, a high-pitched cry or refusing feeds. There may be pain in the back or joints, a severe headache and a stiff neck.

Further very serious symptoms that may develop are:

- •a severe dislike of light
- disorientation
- •a bruise-like rash that does not fade under pressure with a glass tumbler
- •decreasing consciousness

Urgent medical help is needed if meningitis is suspected, and swift action is required.

There are a number of different viruses and bacteria that can cause meningitis but meningococcal group B and C bacteria cause a high number of cases in the UK. Group B is the commonest, but group C causes most deaths. In the UK we are now able to offer a vaccine against group C (but not group B).

Meningitis C is most common in babies and young people aged 15-17. The risk of dying is highest in the older group.

The new vaccine stocks are limited by speed of manufacture and so it is being offered to the most vulnerable first. When supplies are available, it will be given to the following:

- •Young babies with their three routine immunisation appointments, as they need three doses.
- •Babies of 4-12 months need two doses and they will be sent appointments and an explanatory leaflet in the new year.
- •Toddlers having the MMR will be given one dose.
- •Young people of 15-17 will be called at school or college for a single dose.

After these vulnerable groups have been immunised, other preschool children will be called to the surgery and school children called at school. Everyone will be called when his or her turn comes and it is important to attend. Remember, the protection is lifelong, no boosters are needed.

St. James the Great, Bierton

Our Bells...

St. James the Great has a peal of six bells and a separate smaller bell with a higher pitch, usually known as the Sanctus (holy) bell. The main peal is rung from floor level in full view of the congregation. When not in use the bell ropes are drawn up into the tower, gracefully draped.

The full peal of bells is rung for our main Sunday Service, the 9am sung Holy Communion. It is also rung at 6pm on any Sunday when there is a special service, for example when Christine Brewster, our newly ordained priest celebrated the Holy Communion for the first time. Most wedding couples like to have the bells rung, and at the end of the wedding service, when they emerge from the Lady Chapel after signing the Register, the bell ropes are draped to make an arch through which they pass. The bells then ring out the joyful news of another wedding.

Other special occasions include
Christmas and Easter, and on
1st January 2000 a special peal will be
rung at midday to celebrate the new
Millennium.

Bell ringers have to practice, of course, and ours ring from 7.30pm to 9pm on Friday evenings. We also welcome occasional groups of ringers from other churches, who come to try out a different peal. The times are chosen sensitively and not too often!

The traditional reason for having bells is to alert the faithful that a service is imminent. In the days when only the wealthy had clocks or watches, this was important. The small sanctus bell is still rung when the host (the consecrated bread and wine) is elevated at the climax of the Holy Communion service. In past times when there was a

weekday celebration, a farm worker hearing the sanctus bell would pause, face the church and doff his hat for a moment. Another old custom was to toll a single bell when a local resident died, the number of strokes sometimes being equal to the age of the deceased. This usually allowed other local people to identify the deceased. Bells are sometimes half muffled for sad or solemn occasions, producing a very distinctive and sobering sound.

During World War II church bells were to be rung if an invasion of the country was imminent, and also rang when peace came. So church bells mark the life of the church and the community in many ways, regular worship, happy and sad times and sometimes, just people ringing for the joy of it. Christmas 1999

As always there will be a wide range of services to celebrate the birth of Our Lord Jesus Christ. The list below is not complete, as all homes on Watermead will receive full details during early December.

On Sunday 21st December we have our celebration of Christmas carols and readings at St. James's. This service really launches the Christmas season, although it is of course the 4th Sunday of Advent, our time of preparation for our Lord's coming.

On Christmas Eve at 5.30pm we have our Christingle Service at St. James's. This is a lovely service that explains the meaning of the Christingle, after which all the children present, and often most

of the adults receive a small Christingle. You do not have to be brought by a child to attend! Also on Christmas Eve, at 4pm, there is a service at All Saints Church, Hulcott at which the Christmas Crib is blessed.

Our great Christmas celebration of the Holy Communion starts at 11.30pm on Christmas Eve. It is usually standing room only by about 11.20pm, so come early!

As December 26th is a Sunday, our normal services will be held, with Christmas hymns and carols, of course.

On New Year's Eve, there will be a service in church around midnight, to mark the 2000th anniversary of our Lord's birth. As some people will prefer to be elsewhere around this time, we shall also have a service of celebration on New Year's Day at 11am

As we distribute about 3,500
Christmas leaflets in December, we may slip up and miss one or two homes (and we may deliver two or more to others!)
All our distributors are volunteers and may work during the week, they will be delivering when they can. So if you haven't received a leaflet by mid-December, please ring \$\mathbb{T}\$ 426743.

covered the average number of bins per capita in Aylesbury as a whole, the assumption that there were more dogs per capita on Watermead, the fact that people from all over Aylesbury bring their dogs to Watermead for a walk and the costs involved in providing the service. Dog bins were also discussed in general terms. approval. I will post any news


on our notice board, so remember to check it from time to time. Incidentally we will have nine councillors in Watermead.
